From your Pastor

Dear Saints of Concordia,

The disruption of our routines has caused many to wonder their purpose in life. Specifically, for us as Christians, we might ask, "What is God's will for me?" Or, "How can I live a more holy life?". These are fine questions for us to ask. The obvious answer might be that we should pray and study God's Word more. Those are fine answers.

When we pray to Our Father in Heaven, our prayers delight him, more than any sacrifice we could offer. We should be familiar with Psalm 142:1 "Let my prayer rise before you as incense, the lifting up of my hands as an evening sacrifice." Prayer helps shape our worldview to understand our God holds all things in his hands.

Likewise, God delights in our study of his word. It's in this word that he shares with us his wisdom, and all of it points to Christ as our Savior. Like prayer, will help shape our worldview and understanding.

But what about when we're not praying or studying God's Word? What about the other 6 days of the week when we're not participating in the Divine Service? We may be deeply inspired by our Lord Jesus at church or in our devotion time, but what if we don't feel this in the other part of our lives?

Though we may recall from the scrip-

tures that we are to "...pray without ceasing" (1 Thess. 5:16), God has also given us "normal" tasks and jobs in life. From 1 Corinthians 7 "..let each person lead the life that the Lord has assigned to him, and to which God has called him." God has given us all various tasks in life to serve one another.

With this in mind, consider what Jesus said were the greatest two commandments. First, that we love the Lord our God, and second, that we love our neighbor as ourselves. Our various "ordinary" tasks in life outside of church are pleasing to God when they serve our neighbor. It's difficult to think of any job or vocation that does not provide some kind of service to others. We should delight in this, especially when our career may not seem glamorous. For example, janitors may not be held in the highest esteem, but we all prefer having clean public bathrooms to use, and we should be thankful for this service.

If you are struggling with purpose, ask yourself "how can I serve and love those around me better in my callings?". How can we be better husbands or wives, parents or children, neighbors or citizens? Serving one another in love is pleasing to our God, especially when we do it knowing that we are all apart of God's creation that Jesus laid down his life for.

A particular struggle is for those who don't seem to have much of a vocation right now, whether that be a shut-in, someone who is quarantined, or those whose work has been suspended. This is a time to consider your family and relationships, how you may better serve those around you. But even if you cannot do that, rejoice that, though we are sick and afflicted, Jesus is the physician who has

come to save us. There is no better time to realize our sinfulness and inability to do good apart from Jesus than at times when we truly aren't able to do much.

We all could spend more time praying and studying God's word, and this would be a good thing. But we should also recognize the purpose of the various callings that God has placed in our lives. One job is not necessarily more "holy" than another, especially if they are both being done in love. As a pastor, I do have an important job in teaching and preaching God's Word to you. There are many verses that could be quoted about the importance of a pastor. But that doesn't mean I'm more holy or fulfilling God's will better than you as members. I'm just as much a sinner in need of the Gospel as you.

Let us do as St. Paul instructs us in 1 Thessalonians 5 16-18: Rejoicing always in our Lord Jesus, praying ceaselessly (or perhaps better said, continually returning to prayer) and give thanks to God for his blessings to us in all circumstances. In doing these things, we are living out our Father's will for us, no matter what calling or vocation he has given us in life.

# Director Christian Education

Dear Concordia,

There are many times I "drop the ball" in almost every court. I don't show enough love to my toddler, baby, husband, other family members, or friends. I don't write enough letters or call enough people. My house isn't clean enough. Yardwork still needs to be done. That Youtube message could be clearer. I'm not making enough milk or pumping as much as I should. My toddler only wants peanut butter today and I'm letting it happen. I did my best and it's terrible. I'm not eating healthy or exercising enough. It's not my fault, but it is. I didn't listen to this Bible reading or podcast well enough. I didn't even read my Bible today.

I often expect myself to be enough, better, or perfect. Sometimes people can hear me say, "Be better, Sarah." The harsh truth is I'm a sinner. I'm not perfect and never will be on this side of



heaven. No, this doesn't mean to give up and do whatever I want (as wonderful as that sounds). It does mean my expectations of perfection in this life are farfetched and impossible. What about the more realistic things like wanting to give my children enough food or a well-balanced meal? Those seem much more achievable and honestly don't seem related to sin at all. Yet the effects of sin are everywhere.

The world isn't perfect, our desires aren't perfect, and our bodies aren't perfect. My toddler wants the unhealthy food because eating tons of ice cream or peanut butter is delicious. My house isn't clean or even close because the times I do have to clean it, I'm lazy or would prefer something else. The days I didn't have enough time to read my Bible are lies. I can often look back and

see those missed opportunities when I had a few minutes here or there and chose social media over my Bible app.

It's easy to see the problems and defects in the world, our friends and family, and even ourselves. So who cares? Jesus does. He cared enough to see our sins, our original sin, and the results of sin in this world. It's not just the world or us that was broken. It was our relationship with God. That's why Jesus became man, so He could restore the relationship between God and man with His sacrifice on the cross. He was the one sacrifice for all times, places, and peoples. That includes me, my family and friends, and everyone in this broken world.

We will never see perfection on this side of heaven. We can read and hear about it in God's Word in the person of Jesus Christ. But remember, perfection isn't something we can reach in this broken world, especially by our broken, sinful selves. The bar will keep getting further away or we'll pull it closer to ourselves so we can reach our arbitrary perfection goal. In reality, we can never reach God's perfection on our own. ### A Devastating Report

BALTIMORE, Aug. 6, 2020 — Three 40-foot shipping containers filled with humanitarian aid that included thousands of handmade quilts and baby-care items were destroyed in the devastating August 4 explosions at the port of Beirut, Lebanon, the NGO (non-governmental organization) Lutheran World Relief learned today.

The shipment, which also included school supplies for students and personal care kits, were destined for refugees living in Lebanon, principally from Syria and the Palestinian territories. The containers were part of a shipment to be distributed by Anera, an NGO and longtime Lutheran World Relief partner that provides humanitarian assistance and sustainable development to advance the well-being of refugees and other vulnerable communities in the Middle East.

The total value of the lost shipments was approximately \$624,000. The loss of more than 22,000 quilts, sewn by individuals and members of Lutheran congregations across the U.S., could mean a more bitter winter for thousands of refugees, said Melanie Gibbons, deputy director, outreach and engagement at Lutheran World Relief. "Our quilts are made with love by those who painstakingly craft them, and they're deeply appreciated by the people in distress who receive them, both for the warmth and the message of care they provide," Gibbons said. In addition, the shipping containers held 100 cartons of kits filled with school supplies, 300 cartons of personal care kits and 125 cartons of baby care kits.

"Our hearts are breaking as we grieve and pray with our brothers and sisters in Beirut," said Daniel Speckhard, president & CEO of Lutheran World Relief. "We are committed to replacing the aid that was lost and are working on an emergency response to provide assistance as the city recovers and rebuilds." The explosions killed more than 150 people, injured more than 5,000, and left at least 300,000 without shelter. The blast

was strong enough to register as the equivalent of a 3.3-magnitude earthquake and was felt as far as Cyprus, 150 miles away.

Digital Media Development — Lutherans for Life — \$30,000

The mission of Lutherans for Life (LFL) is to equip Lutherans to be Gospel-motivated voices for life. Life issues, such as abortion, embryo experimentation, and physician-assisted suicide, are not political or personal choices but matters of the heart that affect people, neighbors, loved ones, and family. They offer opportunities for us to demonstrate how God's loving grace gives immeasurable importance to every human being, no matter their age, appearance, or ability. One way to equip those making life decisions is through the development of digital media materials.

Almost 89 percent of the people in the United States use the internet, and 77 percent have a social media profile. Digital avenues like the internet, smartphones, and social media offer an open mission field to connect to people, partic-

ularly the younger generations before they face such life issues. Current online conversations surrounding life issues regularly become volatile, most of all for Christian advocates of life's sanctity since our values and perspectives run counter both to fallen human nature and prevailing public opinion.

LFL believes our Savior is calling them into this arena to share the truth in love. They need to translate their life-giving message into this 21st century language. The Digital Media Development grant funds will assist in creating a collection of infographics, memes, shareable video clips, webinars, and podcasts. These tools have the unique ability not only to proclaim, but also to portray and put into motion, how God's power and presence makes human lives worthy — especially to the least and the weakest among us.

LFL envisions that this digital media initiative will serve as a visual witness, while virtual conversation will enable Lutheran individuals and congregations to engage people using social networks such as YouTube, Facebook, iTunes, and Instagram. LWML's support and partnership through this \$30,000 grant will make it possible for LFL to help people treat life issues — and the souls facing them — with courage and compassion.
