From your Pastor

Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

I would like to share with you all regarding two topics: 1. Safely bringing back the common cup to our communion practice, and 2. Kati and I buying and moving into our new home.

Regarding the common cup, I have had several members ask about when it could be safely brought back into practice here at Concordia. After discussing with our Board of Pastoral Care, they have made the recommendation to bring back the common cup on Palm Sunday. I want to discuss the details, as naturally this may be alarming to some.

When Covid first began, I heeded advice to abstain from using the common cup while we learned more about how the virus worked. It was natural to avoid drinking from the same chalice at the same time we were told to distance and avoid personal contact.

Before the onset of Covid, many studies had explored the safety of the common cup. Time-and-time again it has been concluded that it is not a significant spreader of germs, viruses, bacteria due to the alcohol, continual cleansing, and natural resistance of brass.

Similarly, we now have similar studies that show that the common cup is not a significant spread of Covid either. I'll include a link to one of the best studies I have found: https://www.ncbi.nlm.nih.gov/pmc/articles/

It's worth noting that using the common cup is not a requirement to receive Holy Communion. But nor is it just a style. It is the very manner in how our Lord first instituted this holy meal. We never require members to receive the Lord's Supper this way, yet it is an excellent practice and members should be free to use it as they choose. As a pastor, it is the way I normally recommend and teach people to receive it, and yet I will never shame or look down upon those who use individual cups.

I do not want this to scandalize members who might think we are being careless. If you are concerned, I strongly encourage you to reach out to me or any of our elders. I do not want members frightened or upset, but neither is it right to restrict the freedom of those who desire it. I feel confident that we can safely use it again, not just from studies, but also in looking at congregations who have used it throughout the pandemic and have not had issues this whole year.

On a different and more pleasant topic, Kati and I closed on and moved into our new home in the middle of March. Our new address is 5062 N. Graham Rd, Whiteland 46184.

This location moves us a bit closer to church, as well as gives us easy access to I-65 to go to downtown Indy, whether to explore, or if we have members in a hospital like IU Methodist.

We purposely didn't invite the whole congregation to help us move. We felt confident with asking a few, and didn't want to worry about having too many people in close quarters. Lord willing, we will have some kind of open house event for the congregation this summer, depending how Covid conditions are.

The housing market is difficult for buyers right now, so we are incredibly thankful that God provided this opportunity for us. We came close

to buying a home a year ago, and when the deal fell through near the end it was very discouraging. This is why I didn't mention it to very many people at first; I didn't want to talk about the house until it was ours!

Thanks be to God that we were given a good deal and that all went according to plan this time. We pray that this home will be a place to host our family, friends, and members for many years to come.

Large Grant #4 (LWML Indiana Virtual Convention 2020)

Mission Team Grants for Church Workers—MOST Ministries— \$10,000

MOST Ministries is a Recognized Service Organization of the Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod and is asked every year by International Lutheran Churches in partnership with LCMS and LCMS missionaries to send various types of teams into their mission fields to minister to the physical, emotional, and spiritual needs of people in need.

The number of requests for teams grows every year, as do the costs of travel, especially as MOST ministries receives more requests from "ends of the earth" places such as Ghana, Thailand, India, and Guinea. The typical per person cost of a mission trip ranges from \$2,000 to \$4,000, putting participation beyond the reach of many people, even if they feel led by the Holy Spirit to participate.

Returning team members report that this type of short term ministry has been a significant factor in growing their congregations, enhancing understanding of Christ's call to servanthood and enriching attitudes of compassion and forgiveness.

The grant of \$10,000 will be used for grants to called and commissioned members of the Indiana District LCMS and students in the Pastoral, Diaconal, and Graduate Programs of Concordia Theological Seminary, Fort Wayne, to support their participation in MOST Ministries short-term mission trips over the

next biennium. An average grant of \$500-\$800 per person is planned based on specific trip costs.

Music Outreach, Classes, and Resources on the Border—Ysleta Lutheran Mission Human Care, El Paso, Texas—\$98,400

For 17 years, the music ministry at Ysleta Lutheran Mission (YLM) has proven to be a success, reaching out to the unchurched and being a witness to the mercy and grace of Christ, as well as building relationships with music students and training leaders.

One success of this music outreach ministry can be seen in the performing group, Mariachi San Pablo. Their mission is to reach their community through music that inspires and touches the lives of those who hear it. Through the years, members of this group have ranged in age from children, to teenagers, to senior citizens. Some have been lifelong Lutherans, and others are newcomers to the church whom God has brought to faith. While reaching out with the Gospel to those who hear their music, this group has been a ministry of God's love and grace to its members as well.

A young boy, indifferent to the church and religion in general, became involved with the music classes and Mariachi San Pablo. He enjoyed serving others with his growing music skills. He learned traditional hymns, contemporary praise songs, and the liturgy of our church that were taught in the classes. Since becoming a member of the church, he has served the Lord in various positions.

YLM has repeatedly seen the outreach efforts of this ministry bear fruit as students grow in faith as well as in musical ability, and the Mission years to see this discipleship multiplied locally and around the country. To expand this lifechanging ministry of reach out to new students and to increase their services and resources, Ysleta Lutheran Mission Human Care (YLMHC) needs to better equip their classroom and rehearsal space. It also is essential for them to purchase new equipment to enable future recording projects. This mission grant of \$98,400 will help fund the expansion.

Thank You note from Bev Fabricius.

Dear Friends,

Many thanks for your prayers, notes, cards and gifts that you sent while Howard was recovering from COVID 19 complications. Your thoughtfulness and friendship are much appreciated.

We felt truly blessed that Howard was able to come home for an overnight at Christmas. There were no family festivities...just the two of us watching the Christmas Eve service by candlelight. It was a quiet, peaceful time and a lovely memory.

When Howard returned to the facility, he was placed on the quarantine wing where he contracted the virus and was diagnosed on Jan. 4. At first, he did well on the COVID wing, but after two or three days, he steadily declined in eating and activity. On Jan. 20, he was sent to St. Francis with pneumonia and high sodium. When he was released on the 23rd, we had him brought home rather than returned to the facility since his swallowing capabilities were nearly nonexistent. Hospice did their best to make him comfortable and to help us care for him. Wendy came for a week from Colorado, and Sarah, Nancy, and Karin took time off work and gave up days off. Susan and family came from Chicago for a short visit, and her son Mark moved the TV so Howard could watch it from his hospital bed.

After about 5 days of frequent meals consisting of tiny bites of pureed food, frequent choking spells, and spooned thickened liquids, Howard started to show signs of regaining strength. The choking lessened and meals were larger. Finally he was able to sit up in a wheelchair ant the table to eat. After more than two weeks, he started feeding himself and eventually did it with no spills. Quite an accomplishment since in the beginning he wasn't able to find his mouth with a spoon.

After week 3, Karin realized that Howard was still eligible for 20 days of physical therapy in a facility. So back to Homestead he went, now that we knew that he wouldn't starve. The girls returned to their lives, and I was able to get some much needed rest.

Howard has now been at the facility for 20 days. We had hoped that therapy would enable him to get in and out of the car and walk a little as he had done before, but I don't think those goals have been realized. He has never been a very enthusiastic participant in therapy and this time has been no exception. He will stay on at Homestead long term as I realize I do not have the capability to care for him by myself (even with family supervision by the spy camera that Mark installed!) My history of a bad fall and severe drug reaction during the night makes the family nervous about my being alone with Howard for any length of time.

The isolation and lack of communication with the staff and Howard is a never-ending source of frustration for me. Advocating for a loved one who cannot advocate for himself is pretty hard to do through a window, and the care of many nursing home residents suffers for it. Already we have had a medication snafu but the people at Homestead are good-hearted, and some have cared for him for the 6 1/2 years that he has lived there. Now I have to have complete trust that God will watch over him since I have been sidelined.

Tying together the Testaments

In most non-English-speaking nations, the holy day of Easter is known by a word derived from the Hebrew word for Passover: *Pesach*. In Greek, it's *Pasch*; in Latin, *Pascha*; in Spanish, *Pascua*; and in French, *Paques*.

Each spring, Jewish people observe the Passover festival to commemorate how God delivered them from slavery in Egypt. The Christian observance of the Lord's Supper originated with Jesus sharing the Passover Seder meal with his disciples the night Judas betrayed him. Jesus connected the exodus story with his own mission: becoming a "Paschal Lamb" to save his people from the slavery of sin and its consequences.
