From your Pastor

Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

There were several aspects of our Holy Week Services and Easter that I had members either comment or ask about. The Board of Pastoral Care recommended that I write up a response to some of these common questions. As much as I try to be sensitive about knowing what may be new and different for this congregation, some things do slip by! Below are 3 items that were asked about or commented on frequently.

The Paschal Triduum --- pronounced: (**trid**·yoo·uhm)

This is the practice of observing Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Easter as one continues service – sort of like a play with 3 acts. This helps emphasize the continues chain of events that led up to Jesus passion and resurrection.

Maundy Thursday service began relatively "normal", although we did have *The Rite of Corporate Confession*, a lengthier confession that is common to practice before receiving communion on this special day. Other than that, the service was typical up until after communion. Instead of a normal benediction, we had the stripping of the altar, which is a visual sign of Jesus' being betrayed, stripped, and beaten. After solemnly observing this act in silence (often Psalm 22 is read, but I chose to keep it simple this year - look for it in the future!), then the congregation is encouraged to leave silently. It's sort of a cliff hanger, begging us to come back the next night to see what will happen next. *Note: The term "Maundy" comes from the Latin word for "command", referring to Jesus' command to his disciples on that night to love another.*

- As Thursday ended, so Friday began in silence. The Collect of the Day is read, and then after an old testament and epistle reading, the whole Passion according to St. John was Read, with hymn stanzas staggered throughout it. After the sermon and prayers, the service ended, again, in silence. By not having a benediction, we are invited feel a lingering feeling, that more is coming.
- Finally, on Easter Morning, we heard preludes hinting at the resurrection. Then a hymn stanza was sung: "Christ Jesus lay in death's strong bands...but now at God's right hand he stands...therefore let us joyful be...and sing loud songs of Alleluias!"

This text perfectly bridges the severity of Jesus facing death, to the victory we know it brought along with Jesus' resurrection. Accordingly, the congregation then joined in singing "Jesus Christ is Risen Today!" accompanied by robust brass and organ sounds.

The Paschal Triduum is now complete, the third act of Easter morning being the happy and glorious end we were all longing for!

Liturgical Vestments: The Chasuble

For the past 2 years, on Christmas and Easter I have worn a special kind of vestment called a chasuble (*roughly pronounced: CHah-zuhbel*). This vestment was lent to me by Rev. Dan Coffey. Since he serves as a police chaplain, and is often on-call on Sunday mornings, he wanted me to be able to put it to good use on special days.

Traditionally a chasuble would be worn during a Divine Service by the *celebrant* (the pastor preaching and consecrating) to differentiate him from any other assisting pastors. This piece goes over the typical white alb (robe) and liturgically colored stole. Though chasubles are not nearly as common in Lutheran Churches here in America, they were regularly used in Europe before. Functionally speaking, they help cover up the wrinkles, bulges, and velcro or buttons of the tighter fitting alb. More importantly, they help add a beauty and reverence to our service, fitting for our two biggest feast days: Christmas and Easter

Hymn: Christ Jesus Lay in Death's Strong Bands

On Easter I sang two hymn stanzas, both from Luther's hymn "Christ Jesus Lay in Death's Strong Bands". I would argue it is the most powerful Easter hymn text we have, but it is seven stanzas long, and is an unfamiliar tune to most. Rather than challenge the congregation on a day associated with singing well known tunes, I wanted to gradually introduce this treasure of a hymn. Like chasubles, this hymn was an important part of our Lutheran tradition in times past, and can still serve as teaching tool for us today.

Dear Concordia,

Sometimes things that are supposed to be beneficial and blessings can turn into something unhelpful. When we discovered we were having baby two, I asked my husband if I could have an Owlet for a present. This device is a pulse oximeter for babies that will set off alarms if the baby's heart rate is too high or low or if the baby's O2 level is too low. When our oldest was born, I was checking all the time to make sure she was breathing while sleeping. I thought this gift would bring me peace of mind and it did until a few weeks ago. Baby's oxygen was lower than normal. We quickly discovered the baby had a fever. The next night, baby's O2 was even lower. It made for a stressful night because we didn't know at what point we needed to consider an ambulance or ER.

Long story short, we didn't go to the ER and the Owlet isn't the most accurate device, but can be used as a tool to help know when things are wrong. Confirmation is a tool as well. It is a blessing when used appropriately but a bane if not. Confirmation is a mile marker on a journey, not the final destination. The final destination will always be eternal life with our Father in heaven. Confirmation is a rite or a tool to help us on that journey. It's a time when we intensely study the Scriptures and Luther's Small Catechism. It's a time to discover if what we teach in our faith is accurate according to the Scriptures. Confirmation is a time to make a commitment that we will continue learning about God and His Word. It is a time to declare that we intend to remain a disciple and believe

in Jesus until death. At that point we will be with Jesus forever in heaven.

Confirmation can be a wonderful tool or time in someone's life if they use it as a continuation on their faith journey. If used as a graduation from



their faith, this good blessing is ultimately for their detriment. Confirmation isn't an end to faith life. We didn't learn everything we ever can learn about Jesus. If we use it as an excuse to stop coming to church, then we didn't learn about the Commandments, Confession and Absolution, or Holy Communion well.

However, there is always forgiveness. There are times people are stronger in their faith. There is always rejoicing when someone comes back. There is also rejoicing with those who have always been there. During this season of Confirmation, I ask the members of Concordia to encourage our Confirmation students to continue in worship and learning God's Word after Confirmation. Take time to talk with these students. Ask them what they've been learning. Mention that it is a joy to see them in church. We should all strive to encourage each others in faith.

LCMS Deaconess Ministry—LCMS Office of International Mission—\$39,523*

LCMS Deaconesses are women who are full time professional church workers, trained to share the Gospel of Jesus Christ through a ministry of works of mercy, spiritual care, and teaching the Christian faith. The LCMS Deaconess Ministry program will provide LCMS students the opportunity to become a church professional, learning and training to understand the diaconal leadership, the work of deaconesses as applied to body and soul ministry.

Christ's love for the whole person remains the supreme example for Christians, caring for the needy in body and soul. He said,

> For I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, I was naked and you clothed me, I was sick and you visited me, I was in prison and you came to me (Matthew 25:35–36).

LCMS Deaconess Ministry works both domestically and internationally. These women serve in congregations alongside the office of pastor or in institutions where, like the women of old, they may serve as institutional chaplains.

This grant will provide educational and financial support to our partner churches who introduced deaconess training programs within their church bodies like the Philippines, Latvia, Liberia, Indonesia, Malaysia, and India.

Their theological training encompasses two years of studies and one year of internship. The grant helps fund theological education, text books, resources, transportation, student aid, and tuition support to the underprivileged women who have a passion to learn confessional theological studies in order to serve the church.

*This is a partial funding of \$39,523 from the original request for \$90,000. This is the final approved grant from the 2019 Mobile Convention. Beginning in August, we'll feature grants from the Lexington Convention (June 24-27, 2021).

Large Grant #5 (LWML Indiana Virtual Convention 2020)

Concordia Seminary Food Bank, St. Louis—\$10,000

The majority of seminarians struggle to afford the cost of providing healthy food for themselves, their spouses, and their children. They are stretched financially with considerable education-related expenses.

However, the Seminary's Food Bank makes these students' educations more affordable. The Food Bank provides healthy food, personal hygiene products, and needed household items for their family members.

The Food Bank's ministry is a vital blessing helping seminarians and their families as they answer God's call to prepare for the Holy Ministry.

In addition to financial support from caring Christians, this grant of \$10,000 will allow the Food Bank to continue serving seminarians and their families, future deaconesses, and missionaries.



Back-to-back hurricanes destroyed homes, jobs and hope in Central America. Lutheran World Relief is helping its citizens recover and rebuild.

Elsa Marina Amaya was just a child when her entire village of Waller Bordo, Honduras, was destroyed by Hurricane Mitch in 1998. The destruction was so complete that everyone carried their few remaining belongings across the river to rebuild the village on higher ground.

Today Elsa is 30, and she has three young daughters of her own — ages 9, 3 and 6 months. When back-to-back storms Eta and Lota swept through her village last fall, they brought a level of devastation that Elsa and her neighbors had hoped they'd never see again.

Even before the storms hit less than two weeks apart in November 2020, Elsa was struggling to make ends meet. In fact, half of all families living in the low-lying areas near San Pedro Sula, Honduras — one of the poorest places in the world — didn't know where their next meal was coming from.

In the past, Elsa has provided for her family by working as a cook. But when COVID-19 reached Central America last spring, all the kitchens closed and her income dried up. By the time the storms came, she had been unable to find work for months.

Elsa told Lutheran World Relief that her biggest needs right now are food, diapers, milk, medicine and vitamins for her children — only the very basics for their health and survival.

Elsa isn't alone. While most of the homes in Waller Bordo were spared the worst of the damage, the storms' heavy rains completely wiped out the village's primary livelihoods — corn and palm oil production. Their hard work and hope for the future were literally swept away. Now these families have no idea how they'll feed their children or pay their bills in the months to come.

With monetary gifts, we can help Lutheran World Relief share love with our neighbors affected by Hurricanes Eta and Lota in the form of food, water, safe temporary shelter, tools and building supplies. Our gifts will also walk alongside these families in the years to come, as they rebuild homes and restore crops and livelihoods. Gifts to LWR will also help in the urgent efforts to get COVID-19 vaccines into the arms of people who are at high risk in countries like Honduras. For more information visit lwr.org.

talk about the effort to save the Lutheran Theological Seminary in Novosibirsk, Siberia. The presentation promises to be an engaging description of the rebuilding of the Lutheran Church in Russia following the destruction of the Church under the communist Soviet Union. It will highlight the establishment of a Russian Lutheran Seminary, the training of new pastors to replace those killed and exiled by the atheist Marxist government, and the robust evangelism and thorough catechetical efforts of the young

Russian Lutherans in the post-Soviet era. The presentation will also describe alarming parallels between how the communist revolution systematically destroyed the Russian political, social, economic, moral, and religious culture replacing it with the "messianic" soviet socialism and similar efforts to destroy American religious culture today.
