Large Grant #1 (LWML Indiana District Convention 2022) Delegates at the 2022 LWML Convention in Fort Wayne awarded 15 grants out of 22 applicants for a total of \$130,000. In the coming months, we'll highlight one each month based on the votes they received.

Concordia Theological Seminary Food & Clothing Co-op – Fort Wayne, IN – \$10,000

Individuals from around the country and the world come to Concordia Theological Seminary to prepare to serve God's people here in the United States and to work worldwide. When these students leave their jobs and come to the seminary with their families, they no longer have the same financial flow of funds they had before but continue to have the exact financial needs. Spouses in many student families do find employment in Fort Wayne. Still, most are marginalized because the employers know they will only be here for a short time, throwing families in difficult financial positions.

The seminary seeks to reduce this financial burden by providing students access to a Food Co-op which currently supplies between 80% and 90% of all families' food and household needs each month at no cost to the student, relying upon donations from individuals, congregations, and organizations.

The \$10,000 will allow the Co-op to purchase perishable items for the seminary student families for the 2022-2024 biennium.

Caring For and Sharing Christ with Hurting People – Concordia Seminary, St. Louis – \$100,000

Deaconesses are professional church workers trained to the share the Gospel of Jesus Christ through works of mercy, spiritual care, and teaching the Christian faith. Equipped with God's Word, deaconesses share the Good News of Jesus Christ with those who have not yet heard it. In reaching out to those in need, deaconesses continually point them toward the cross.

Deaconesses may serve in the parish, in institutions, or in the mission field. Their specific ministries change depending on their call, but all deaconesses reach out and care for others as they share the love of Christ. They lovingly and selflessly provide much-needed care and works of mercy to people who are suffering and often marginalized. These include people who are sick, homeless, disabled, malnourished, homebound or hospitalized, enduring grief or loss, in hospice care, or living in nursing homes or convalescent homes. They also may serve those who are mentally ill, troubled youth, teen mothers, children of divorce, and those suffering from neglect or domestic violence.

The deaconess certificate is awarded to women in various ways. Some women complete the three-year residential program at Concordia Seminary or the dual degree program while also studying at St. Louis University. Some women receive their training and certification by participating in a four-year distance course study through Center for Hispanic Studies (CHS) or Ethnic Immigrant Institute of Theology (EIIT). Starting in the spring of 2021, women can become certified as they study four years in their home area through the online deaconess studies program.

Deaconesses serving in a parish may visit shut-ins or make hospital calls. They may manage the Sunday School program, lead women's' Bible studies, and work with the youth. Regardless of how they serve, they listen and grow to understand the needs of those they serve.

Some deaconesses may serve as a hospital chaplain or work in an institution that is a Recognized Service Organization of the LCMS. They may serve as counselors at a center for troubled youth or minister to unwed mothers who learn to care for their child.

Deaconesses, who are recent immigrants to the United States, use their languages skills and understanding of different cultures to help people assimilate into this country. They understand the struggles immigrants are facing and keep pointing them to the loving arms of Christ.

The money from this grant will help fund scholarships for the training of women to become certified deaconesses. It will also cover some of the costs of managing the deaconess training program at Concordia Seminary, St. Louis.

From your Pastor

On Stewardship

Stewardship is an easy topic to avoid addressing too deeply at church. It can feel like a more polite term to talk about a "dirty" topic: money.

Everyone would agree that churches should not be too focussed on money. Often we remind ourselves that we're not a business, and we rely on volunteers, and we'll trust in God to get us by.

This all is said until money becomes a problem. When there is not enough, we're suddenly very motivated to talk about money, motivated by fear. Nothing good will happen when the Church is motivated by fear.

Thanks be to God, Concordia is *not* having money problems. In fact, we've received many generous donations lately.

Now is the perfect time to talk about money. Not as a dirty topic. Not out of fear. But out of opportunity. There is a time to give thanks for generous gifts, but giving thanks is not all that God desires from us. He desires and has given us duties to tend to here on earth. There is a time to give thanks to God for he what has blessed us with, but there is more for us to do: roll up our sleeves and get to work!

To be clear, Concordia is founded on the sure foundation of Christ. But God works through his people to provide for his people. We have work to do here on earth. That's what stewardship is all about.

I was deeply moved by a speaker I heard this summer at one of my conferences. This pastor argued that our primary vocation, and every vocation, as Christians is that of being stewards. Adam and Eve were stewards over all creation. Spouses are stewards to each other. Parents are stewards to their children. Children too at times are stewards for their parents and households. All forms of employment is stewardship, assuming it is not purely for personal gain and offers a good service to our communities.

In all these things, we are putting to work what God gave us. All of our skills, our time, our focus and effort. We put our hearts into what God has given us to do. And that includes our giving back.

There is no law for how much we give to God. Often we use the Old Testament as a guide, specifically the tithe of 10%, the first fruits being offered to God before we take any for ourselves. This was a law for the Old Testament Saints to remind them *everything* truly comes as a blessing from God.

For us today it is not a law. As a pastor, I do recommend it is a good guide. But God desires a cheerful giver, not one who gives out of guilt or being enticed. I encourage all Christians to be responsible over their finances, acknowledge and repent of selfish motives with our money (our selfish nature will never have enough!), and then genuinely consider what we can share with others, including our congregation. It is a good practice to have a set amount we set apart to give back to God first. It may not be 10%, and it's not required to be 10%. We are all in different situations financially. Genuinely consider what you have, try setting a goal of some amount to give back to God first, and then give with love freely towards God, free from any guilt.

Thankfully we have more to give than money. We do use much volunteer work, both in effort, but also in planning and leading. One of my goals with our leadership is to plan how we can be better at delegating work to people who wish to give their time and talents. Sometimes we're not good at asking for help - I personally struggle much with this!

It is good for our congregation to be a place where members can come do their part. We don't need a few superheroes, we ought to be a community spreading the work around. It's good when we all collectively roll up our sleeves in cooperation: some in detailed planning, some in physical toil, some in cleaning and beautifying, others in reaching out and contacting the lonely, and *all* of us in prayer!

To be a Christian is to be a Steward. We are only what God has made us and given us. We're never done, there's always more work. Let us be glad to work in God's vineyard, whether we are one who started early in the morning, or if we greet those who come along later to lend a helping hand. None of it is truly our work anyway.

At the end of our lives of stewardship labor, we can look forward to the rest Jesus offers us. A time will come when our long weary race is done, and our Lord Jesus will place on our heads the Crown of Eternal Life. We'll relax at his great wedding banquet, where our work will be forever done. We will feast forever in the presence of our God, the Lamb who was Slain and yet reigns, having conquered sin and death for us forever.

Pastor appreciation

Many churches observe October as Pastor Appreciation Month. Given the reluctance of many pastors to call attention to themselves, it's not likely that they will mention anything about being appreciated.

Were someone to ask a pastor, however, what might be done to show appreciation to him the answer would likely be, "Pray for me."

St. Paul never asked for anything for himself except that others pray for him. To the church at Rome, he wrote, "I appeal to you, brothers and sisters, by our Lord Jesus Christ and by the love of the Spirit, to join me in earnest prayer to God on my behalf, that I may be rescued from the unbelievers in Judea, and that my ministry to Jerusalem may be acceptable to the saints, so that by God's will I may come to you with joy and be refreshed in your company" (Romans 15: 30-32).

Encourage your pastor and called workers by assuring them of your prayers and love.

On Reformation Sunday, as we think about Martin Luther, the 16th-century reformer of the church, we rejoice that God raises men and women in every era to lead movements which serve the kingdom of God. God calls men and women out of the world to learn the meaning of commitment, love and service. God then sends these people back into the world to put their commitment, love and service to work. That's how the kingdom of God is spread and how God's church remains alive and healthy.
