Congregation at Prayer

“How is God’s name kept holy?” God’s name is kept holy when the Word of God is taught in its truth and purity, and we, as the children of God, also lead holy lives according to it. Help us to do this, dear Father in heaven! But anyone who teaches or lives contrary to God’s Word profanes the name of God among us.

Protect us from this, heavenly Father!”

– Luther’s Small Catechism, First Petition of the Lord’s Prayer

Prayer is the simple means which God gives to us to ask Him as dear children for the things we need. His Word is given to us that we would know God’s Will among us, and that the Holy Spirit would be given to us, giving us the power and strength to trust solely in Jesus Christ.

Prayer and God’s Word are great gifts to us, and ones we can enjoy easily, every day of our lives. Enjoying these gifts doesn’t need to be complicated, but can be as complex or uncomplicated as you need. Martin Luther gives the simplest way to enjoy these gifts in the Small Catechism. He encourages starting and ending each day with a simple prayer and a sign of the Cross, invoking the name of the Holy Trinity. These things remind us and keep our hearts focused on the one thing that’s truly needful, and helps us to cast our cares and doubts onto God.

There are many resources out there for structuring this daily prayer and meditation on God’s Word, and whatever you use to get into the Word daily is great. If you’re not sure where to start, there are some wonderful resources easily accessible to anyone. The *Treasury of Daily Prayer*, published by CPH, offers a daily reading from the Old Testament, New Testament, some edifying words from a Church Father, and a simple collect to pray. This is great for those who need a structure but aren’t sure where to start. The same daily readings are listed in the front of the *Lutheran Service Book*, under ‘Daily Lectionary’ on page 299. Just before this page are some simple orders of service that you can pray right in your own home, to accompany these readings. The head of any household can lead these services and guide his family to pray, as dear children would ask their dear Father.

Jesus Restores Paradise and Feeds Us Freely

In the Garden of Eden, our first parents received food freely from the gracious hand of God, apart from any burdensome work (Gen 2:7–17). But after the fall, food would be received only through toil and labor. The curse declared, “By the sweat of your face you shall eat bread, till you return to the ground . . .” (Gen. 3:19). In other words, “The wages of sin is death” (Rom. 6:23). But into this wilderness world came Jesus the Messiah to restore creation. Having compassion on the weary multitudes, He renewed the bounty of Eden on the third day, freely granting an abundance of bread to the 4,000 (Mark 8:1–9). So also our Lord Jesus, having endured the burden of our sin, was raised on the third day to bring us back to Paradise. He now miraculously turns the bread of death into the Bread of Life in the Sacrament, giving you His very body and blood for your forgiveness. For “the free gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord” (Rom. 6:23).

Director of Christian Education

There are so many things that happened in July and are continuing into August. The one that weighs heaviest on my heart is the National Youth Gathering. The LCMS National Youth Gathering takes place every three years, bringing together around 20,000 youth and adults to share their faith in Christ.

There are servant events during the Gathering. This year, 160,704 Mercy Meals were packed. Additionally, 6,700 resource kits were assembled, 3,380 individuals served off-site, 2,000 backpacks and health kits were prepared, 652 inches of hair were donated, 567 pints of blood were given, 450 diapers were sewn, and 320 braille books were created. There were also likely several thousand pounds of beads sorted. Our youth participated in sorting beads into groups of 12 and placing them into bags until we reached 30 pounds. Our table alone sorted 180 pounds of beads in about 45 minutes.

There are many powerful moments at the National Youth Gathering. Sometimes it's a sectional, an interaction with a speaker, meeting new friends or old, a concert, or worshipping and communing with around twenty thousand other Lutherans. The moment that struck me the hardest this year was "Tribute Night." It's not some dystopian Hunger Games thing—it's a beautiful moment where churches submit photos of youth and adult leaders who are now in heaven but would have attended the Gathering if they were still on earth. It's always emotional, but this year it hit me hard.

That morning in Bible study, I learned one of our preschool parents was declared brain dead recently. It was particularly heavy because her daughter graduated with my oldest. I could easily see myself in her place.

There is always hope for a miracle. Jesus showed us this in John 11 with Lazarus. It's hard, because we want to pray for miracles; but what is the greatest mercy? Having the loved one here on earth with us; or the loved one being with God forever in heaven? Here on earth, I want my loved one here with me. In reality, I should praise and thank God my loved one is safe, forever in His arms. During the tribute, I was thinking about this mom and her faith and trust in Jesus. I know she is one of those washed by the blood of the Lamb, now singing with the saints in heaven. In that moment, the best way I could love and honor her life and witness was to sing with her and with the cloud of witnesses who endured before her. In that Mass Event, all I could do was praise God with her.

Now that I'm home, there are practical things I can do to show love and compassion to her family. I have many questions, but ultimately, they don't matter. My gracious God is giving me the opportunity to serve this family in some way. My gracious God extends forgiveness to this parent through Christ's death and resurrection. My gracious God has given her eternal life—one of the greatest miracles our loving Lord can give. And my gracious God extends all those same gifts to me and to all believers. The day after I wrote this article, I did find out she was "officially" in heaven; at least from what our human measurements could declare. In reality, only God knows how long she's been in heaven, but we do know God welcomed her with open arms and her place is ready. This does give some comfort to her family on earth; but I can't imagine the family's lament, pain, and logistical battles on the days to come. I can't imagine the questions they have for God; but I'll can trust that the God who loves me so much loves them too and will give them the faith and help they need to sustain this earthly body and life.

It will be hard, but in my grief, I will praise God that she ran the race with endurance and looked to Jesus, the founder and perfecter of her faith. I will praise God that He joyfully endured the cross for all believers. I will praise Him that He now sits in heaven, and that one day, I will join her and all

believers in praising Him—not as a mere 20,000 people, but as the whole people of God across every tribe, race, and generation.

Thanks be to God, who endured so much for us.

The delegates to the Omaha convention approved \$2,622,270 to fund 33 Mission Grants for the upcoming biennium (2025-2027). Other fun statistics from Omaha include 713 who flew, 21 who arrived by train, 2,423 who came by car/van, 572 who arrived via motorcoach, 69 children registered for camp, 272 singers in the choir, 806 attendees at the Wake Up In The Word Bible studies, approximately 73,680 hugs given, and 10/10s for everyone brave enough to sing karaoke,

2025-2027 Mission Grant #1 (Omaha Convention)

Regional Disaster Response LERT Shower Trailers, LCMS Office of National Mission, Disaster Response Ministry, U.S. — \$81,500

Lutheran Early Response Teams (LERT) serve thousands of individuals and families who are suffering from loss in the wake of disasters like hurricanes, floods, earthquakes, fires, and tornadoes. When deployed, LERT teams traditionally use congregations in the disaster areas as their base camps. The host congregations provide a place for the LERT teams to sleep, eat, rest, recover, and receive spiritual care during their time of service. Host congregations are incredible to work with as the teams help them rebuild their communities and share the life-changing message of the Gospel. One challenge for team members has been the lack of showers and laundry facilities at a host church. LERT members have showered at national gym chains, in members' homes, in personal campers, or even under cold garden hoses. This grant will fund half the cost of two combination bathroom/shower/laundry trailers for use during disaster response work.

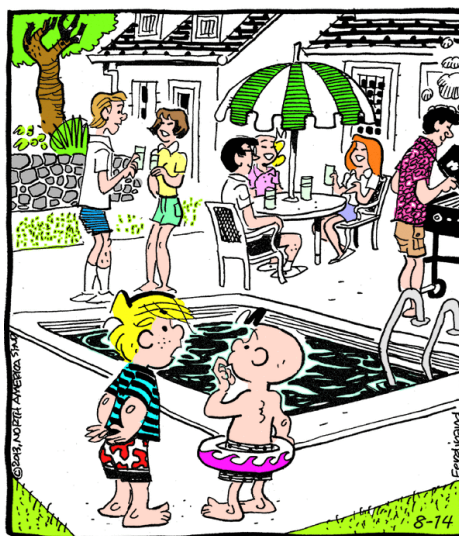
