The Art of Dying Well

In the great Litany (pg. [xxx] in Lutheran Service Book), we pray that God would preserve us from a "sudden and evil death." So often in movies and other media, the dying are shown to be begging for a quicker end. Often a swift death is considered 'good'. This is how we get the word euthanasia - 'good death'. But what makes this death 'good'? To the world, a good death is one which you have control over, one which you feel little or no pain, and one which you (to put it frankly) do not even have to think about your own mortality. Why is this good, according to the world? The world believes that you should be 'in control' of your own destiny and every aspect of your life. It's "your" life, "you" should manage it how "you" like. The world also believes and teaches you that all suffering, no matter what or why, is bad. No one should ever feel pain ever, it says. And ultimately, the world does not believe there is anything on the other side of death. A great and unfathomable nothing. A void. Blackness. So there's nothing to consider or contemplate in death. It's just like an animal, you've reached the end of your purpose and now you can just fade away.

But this is not what we believe, teach, or confess. This death is not good. This is not the way Christians should look at death. So, again, we pray that God would protect us from "sudden and evil death." Why? Regarding 'sudden' death, why is suddenness such a problem? Shouldn't we be able to ignore our mortality, and enter death in a blissful 'peace'? Well, we should enter death at peace – but not in a drunken stupor, but in the confidence and peace which only Christ can give. Sudden death is not good for us, because death requires preparation. It requires contemplation of our mortality, our dependence on Christ, and the faith which we confess. If you die suddenly, there is no time to reconcile with family members and other people you may have sinned against, other people have no time to reconcile their sins against you, and there is no time to consider the promises of Christ as you approach Abraham's bosom. When we pray against a sudden death, we aren't asking for a tortuous death – we're merely asking for a death we can see coming, and allow us time to prepare for it.

Regarding 'evil' death, this is referring to tragedy. Death which appears in the darkness, at the hands of wicked men. All death is a result and wage of sin, but this sort of death is the direct result of sin in other men. Fatal car accidents, medical malpractice, premeditated violence, the list could go on. Tragic death is sad and hard for family and friends to cope with. The grief accompanying these deaths is particularly difficult.

So when we face death, we pray that we would not die a death full of fear and sin, but that we would enter into eternal life, confident with the saving name of Jesus Christ on our lips, and the fear, love, and trust in God in our hearts.

We can together sing the final stanza of "Lord Thee I Love with All My Heart," (*LSB*#708)

Lord, let at last thine angels come, to Abr'ham's bosom bear me home that I may die unfearing; and in its narrow chamber keep my body safe in peaceful sleep until thy reappearing.

And then from death awaken me that these mine eyes with joy may see, O Son of God, thy glorious face, my Savior and my fount of grace.

Lord Jesus Christ, my prayer attend, my prayer attend, and I will praise thee without end.

I'm glad people told me they liked the church history pictures on social media because that task became bigger than I thought; but in a good way. Thankfully, I could usually tell why a particular document or bulletin was saved. One phrase I saw consistently, especially in the two years of Concordia's history was "venture of faith." Rev. Kaiser, the first pastor at Concordia, and I assume others would refer to Concordia as a venture of faith.

The word venture is a risky or uncertain undertaking. Starting a new church in 1956 I'm sure seemed like a venture. I wonder if it was really a venture? When we take the time to discern God's will, make the necessary calculations, and pray; is it all that risky?

In December, I think about Mary and Joseph. Joseph wanted to quietly divorce Mary, but God sent the angel to say what Mary said was true and that she carried God's Son. Joseph still could have divorced Mary. I'm sure there were rumors. Who is the real father of this child? For Joseph, marrying Mary would look like a risk. But the angel told him to not fear to take Mary as his wife. Joseph didn't have to do it and for Joseph's own reputation it would be better not to. Yet, he took a venture of faith.

Joseph puts his trust in the Lord and became the earthly father figure to Jesus. God continued to keep the family safe. After the visit of the Magi, Joseph is warned in a dream to flee because Herod wants to kill Jesus. Who wants to move or go on a long trip with a toddler? Once again, Joseph took a venture of faith and listened to God's Word through the angel and fled to Egypt to keep Jesus safe.

When the child Jesus grew, a greater venture of faith would take place. Jesus told his disciples in Luke 9 that the Son of Man must suffer, die, and in three days rise. Jesus knew going to Jerusalem was a venture of faith. However, it wasn't a venture. We may see it as such with our human perspective, but our omniscient God knows it's just what needs to be done. Jesus knew what would happen. Jesus knew he would suffer, be murdered, and rise again. Jesus knew he would be the sacrifice to atone for the sins of all times, places, and people. Jesus knew it was him because no one else could live a life free from sin except the one who is True God and True Man. It wasn't risky. Jesus knew what would happen. Jesus trusted and submitted to the Father's will so that all who believe in Jesus as their Savior may be saved and go to heaven. There was no risk involved, just humble submission.

It was driven by faith and trust. When Concordia began years ago, it must have seemed risky. Yet, God worked through His Word and His Sacrament to grow His church. God was there because God promises to be found in His Word and Sacrament. We

continue to seek God every Sunday through His Word and Sacrament. I pray we all continue to see God in His Word throughout the week as well. While I'll always appreciate the poetry of the venture of faith; I wonder what steps can we as individuals and a church take in faith through this Advent and Christmas season and into the new year? Where will God guide us as we continue to listen to Him and seek Him with all our hearts?

LWML Mission Grants at Work

2025-2027 Mission Grant #4 (Omaha Convention)

The Perpetual Call for Pastors and Teachers — LCMS Office of Pastoral Education, U.S. — \$100,000 (see #4, pg 3.)

Set Apart to Serve is a Synod-wide initiative focused on forming and recruiting full-time pastors and church workers. Supplying the church with church workers is one of the highest priorities of the LCMS, since pastors and commissioned church workers preach and teach the Word of Christ through which the Holy Spirit creates and sustains faith. The demand for more pastors, Lutheran school teachers, and commissioned church workers is urgent. Set Apart to Serve is providing resources to encourage intentional conversations with youth to pursue a vocation in church work. The Set Apart to Serve initiative is leading to increased enrollment in the church worker formation programs at the LCMS Concordia universities and the seminaries. Districts and churches are being encouraged to reach out to their youth through workshops and conferences. This grant will help cover part of the expenses for creating resources, travel, and presentations at workshops and conferences, and staffing.

Christmas Cookie Exchange

This year, for our Church Christmas Party in December, we will host a cookie exchange. Anyone who would like to participate is invited to bring 1-2 batches of ONE KIND of cookie to the party. The day of the exchange, we will line the cookies up and everyone can go through and get some of each kind of cookie so people will end up with a container of multiple kinds of cookies instead of just one kind they brought to the exchange. We will also take some of the cookies and put them into the Christmas gifts for the homebound members. More information will come out later about the exchange and Christmas party, but we wanted to share the information now for those who plan out their holiday bakes!


