Being Pro-Life

In January, we often reflect on the gift of life which we have from our Creator and Lord, and also about life issues that we face in the world. We usually select the month of January to do this, because of the passing down of *Roe v. Wade* on January 22, 1973. Even after the recent overturning of this decision, putting abortion legislation in the court of the states, abortion remains a black mark on our nation's list of her many sins.

So why are Lutherans, and many other Christians, opposed to abortion?

We oppose abortion because it is the willful murder of the innocent, expressly prohibited by the Fifth Commandment, "You shall not murder." The Lord again and again charges the Israelites, and those in authority over them, that their duties are to protect the fatherless, the widows, and the innocent.

The reasons used to justify abortion are numerous. They usually appeal to cases of heinous crime, stringent health matters, and simply, poverty. While these are all serious matters to consider, they rarely, if ever, justify the execution of the innocent. As the result of a crime. for example, the child is not the one who committed the crime. Why are they punished for a crime which they did not commit? The perpetrator, in a just society, will be the one punished. Again, poverty is also not a reason to be killed. This line of argument is telling the poor that their lives aren't worth living. To be sure, we could do many things to aid the poor. I think that's important. Christ our Lord and the apostles say many things regarding the support of the poor. The Lord frequently tells the Isrealites to help their poor brothers. But the execution of their children is not, in fact, aiding them. What no one seems to mention is that all of these reasons make up 1% or less of all performed abortions. The rest are performed 'electively', that is, the mothers cite no reason for requesting an abortion. They seek one out, because they believe their lives will be easier afterward.

We confess that it is the Lord who gives, and who takes away. He kills and makes alive. It is not in our hands to take the lives of men, created in God's image. God says to Noah, "Whoever sheds the blood of man, by man shall his blood be shed, for God made man in his own image." (Gen. 9:6) There are offices in which killing is given, such as that of the government ("for he [the magistrate] does not bear the sword in vain," Rom. 13:4) But for the rest of us, we are not called to kill. And furthermore, no one is called to kill the innocent. Rather, it is our duty to protect them, prevent them from false punishments of the law, and, unfortunately in our day, their parents and doctors.

Often these women are burdened with the guilt of what they've done. This burden of guilt is really greater than whatever suffering they might endure without it. They're also ashamed of the circumstances that led them to it. But Christ brings forgiveness even for these, if they repent. Christ brought forgiveness for St. Paul, even after his heinous crimes against the Church. But Paul repented of them, and no longer persecuted the Church. He found comfort in Christ and in His Cross.

I have so many favorite trips to Disney, but one of my favorites was going around Christmastime. Of course, the parks are beautiful, but that year I experienced something new to me. In EPCOT, each country had their own version of Santa Claus—or a similar figure—who shared Christmas traditions from their culture. Since not every country is primarily Christian, some of these figures were very different from the Santa we're used to.

The one that stuck with me most was Mexico, where the Three Kings appeared. In Mexico, Christmas isn't traditionally the main gift-giving day. Instead, gifts are given on January 6th, known as Three Kings Day. In the Christian calendar, we call this day Epiphany, when we celebrate the wise men visiting Jesus. And what did the wise men bring when they visited Him? Gifts. Honestly, it might make more sense to give gifts on January 6th—but to each their own.

Of course, the greatest gift of all was given in that small town of Bethlehem. God was made manifest. He became human—not in power or splendor, but in humility and lowliness. Jesus lived the perfect life we could not live and then willingly died on the cross so that our sins could be forgiven. No gift could ever compare to what Christ has done for us. It isn't a toy forgotten after a week or something that breaks after a few years. It is an act with eternal significance.

Hopefully, everyone enjoyed their Christmas with a focus on Christ our Savior. And hopefully, we continue to rejoice daily in the gift of salvation He offers to us. We also pray that God continues to reveal Himself to the world, so that all who walk in darkness may see the light of life.

Tuesday, Friday 9am-11:30am \$125/month for 10 months


Registration Fee

This total includes the care package, 12 Cards of Hope, and postage. The care packages are hand-decorated, and their contents are customized to the recipient's age and gender. They are filled with simple, practical comfort items for cancer patients to use during treatment. Phil's Friends is 100% donor-supported. This grant will purchase supplies for care packages and Cards of Hope, and will cover shipping and postage, supporting 1,000 cancer patients for 1 year.


